letter with Aclamation and Joy. We are stationed here in Mexico and I do not know how long we shall have to stay here but I know that we will

have to stay here untill after the Dissult of the Mexican Congress is known and if peace is made we will soon be started home and if not we will have to go to San Luis Potosi where there some Mexican soldiers but there is no account how many but there is not many in this country here is a level and warm country. But the mountain parts is very uneven and cold in part we have seen no rain of any consequence since our arrival at this place. But while we was at Dallago it rained so great deal



I can inform you that wheat  
is in a fine way of heading and  
we have seen ripe barley in the  
month of January and the inhabitants  
were in fine way of gathering their  
crops of corn and barley = there is young  
corn up here now half by high and looks  
very well, there is water melons and  
muskmelons peaches and apples and  
black berries in quantities and and  
the market is generally glutted with  
vegetables of every description, I can inform  
you that my son is a boat

## CIRCULAR ADDRESS.

RALEIGH, March 10, 1818.

THE Trustees of the RALEIGH ACADEMY, sincerely desirous of promoting the general good of the Youth committed to their care, and deeply deploring every departure from Moral Rectitude which youthful Fancy, with ardent passions, too often suggests, have not only provided, at great expense, able, efficient and well-qualified Teachers to instruct them in Literature, Science and Moral Truth, but have constantly watched over their general Deportment with a fatherly solicitude.

In thus fulfilling their duty, the Trustees have found their reward in the uniform prosperity of the Institution of which, for many years, they have had the management, and in witnessing every day the beneficial results to individuals and to the community.—But this, like all other human institutions, to render it useful to the greatest practical extent, requires that it should be governed by laws well defined and adequate to every probable evil.

The laws of this Academy have always forbidden all manner of extravagance; and the Trustees have discountenanced it by their advice and influence, and by reproof, both public and private: Still, however, a few instances are seen. To guard against the recurrence of such pernicious acts, the Trustees feel it their duty to call upon Parents and Guardians for their concurrent authority. In vain may the laws of the Academy, with all their sanctions, prohibit Students from incurring debts, if their Parents and Guardians give them credit, or permit them to obtain it. Experience has abundantly proved, that where the means are furnished, or where facilities are afforded for acquiring the means, for Students' living above the limits of a proper economy, such Students will, in any Seminary, however strict the laws, become idle and dissolute; and in proportion as an inordinate passion for show is cherished, the more noble passions for Knowledge and Truth, will languish.

Under the influence of these Truths, and a conscientious desire to discharge their duty, the Trustees did, at their last meeting, amend and strengthen their laws on this subject.—They declared, among other provisions, that no Female Student should appear at the Academy but in a plain, neat and cheap dress, without any extravagance, either in clothes, trinkets or other ornaments—and that no Student of the Academy, under the age of twenty-one years, whether male or female, shall incur any debt, for articles or for money, either personally or by another, without the consent of his or her Parent or Guardian—of which consent the Student shall furnish evidence, if required by the Faculty. And it is made the duty of the Principal of the Academy to report to the Board of Trustees all offenders against this latter provision, to the end that Parents and Guardians may be forthwith informed. It was moreover resolved, that an Appeal be made to Parents and Guardians, requesting them expressly to forbid, and by their influence and authority to prohibit their Children and Wards from incurring any debt whatever, but such as they may license and define, either verbally or by letter, to Agents selected for that purpose. Such, for example, as the person with whom the Student boards, or one of the Teachers, or any other friend, explaining to such Agent the extent of the power intended to be conferred, either as to the probable amount, or the species of debt, or both.

All Parents and Guardians of Students at the Raleigh Academy, are therefore earnestly requested and entreated, as they value the prosperity of this Institution, and more especially as they regard the good of their Children and Wards, to act in concert with the Trustees on this important subject.



# AN ADDRESS

To the People of the Congressional District composed of the Counties of Halifax, Campbell and Pittsylvania.

## YELLOW CITIZENS,

The time for a new election of your Congressional Representative will soon occur. In obedience to the wishes of my friends, and many respectable freeholders among you, I have determined to become a Candidate for that arduous and responsible station. I sincerely regret that my private business and the shortness of the time, will render it out of my power to cultivate your acquaintance, and pay you that attention which ought never to be dispensed with by a candidate for popular favor. From personal considerations I promise myself but little, as a great portion of you are unknown to me, and still less from that influence which arises from separate interests, parties, or family connexions, as I have always made the great interest of the community the polar star to guide my private and public conduct.

I deem it proper in the first place to declare that I have not been induced to adopt this course, from a spirit of hostility or opposition to the late member; nor do I intend to array myself as the advocate or adversary of any party, men or measures, further than the public welfare, upon due consideration, may justify. In regard to myself, it is no less my duty to say, that I am actuated only by the laudable ambition of having an opportunity of devoting my humble faculties to the service of my country, and by a belief that it is my duty to do so. In relation to my political sentiments I might safely refer to my conduct as a representative in the Legislature of Virginia, and to the columns of the newspapers published in the town of Lynchburg and the city of Richmond.—They have all derived their origin from the same political fountain, have been designed to promote the cause of free government, and uniformly to impart the feelings and opinions of a mind, unchangeably attached to the genuine principles of civil liberty. But upon this occasion, it is proper I should say more, as there never was a time since the foundation of our government, that rendered it more necessary for a candidate for public confidence, to make known his political principles, and to give a general outline of his intended course. I consider it therefore an indispensable duty to make the following declarations, that it may conduce to a more distinct expression of the public voice, and that every citizen, when about to exercise the sacred and important right of voting, may know what he opposes and what he is about to support. To begin then—Born, fellow citizens, in this land of liberty, and raised under a representative republican government—To the investigation of the principles upon which it is founded, I gave the earliest attention, and as I believe it to be the only system, calculated to secure the religious and political rights of my fellow-creatures, I trust to my God that under it I may die.

Upon the purity and independence of elections depend the prosperity of this beautiful & excellent form of government upon the people, an emanation of their strength, all power belongs to them.—Their representatives are their agents, and ought to be bound by their will; here political power begins—and there is a chain from the lowest to the highest office under our government. When you advance to the polls then, my fellow citizens, you will certainly discharge this all-important and primary duty, with circumspection and prudence: by such conduct you can only guard and preserve that temple of liberty which was erected by the hands of our fathers.

In a republican government merit ought only to give a man a claim to public patronage. Here the opinions of the people are appealed to, and the mind meets the mind upon equal grounds with the weapons of truth and reason. What can be better calculated to promote the happiness of a poor man than the prospect of rising to the highest office in the country? Here his honest pride and industry is not insulted by the impudent pretensions of privileged classes—No unnatural disqualifications stand in his way to usefulness. The people here are every thing—princes and kings, nothing. What can be more grateful to the feelings of a citizen, than the free unbiased exercise of that right, by which he calls to his service the man of his choice, and places him to guard his rights in the councils of his country.

I am, fellow citizens, by principle and education a republican, of a firm and moderate character, for moderation I admire.—It is the origin of all the virtues of man—Violence and intolerance are strangers to my breast, and shall never mark my private or public conduct.

In a district, however, composed of men of such independent sentiments, who are materially different in their political as well as religious tenets, it would be equally arrogant and impracticable to attempt to publish a treatise, either religious or political, which would give general satisfaction. In the town where I reside, upon I well know that so many descriptions of persons, differing upon temporal as well as eternal matters, and that individuals of each denomination support respectable stations and honorable characters, it would be folly and arrogance to pretend to assume a position in politics or religion with which they would all accord.—Without arrogating to myself the credit of having adopted opinions either in religion or politics, which deserve to be preferred to others, I can with sincerity say, that I have given a decided preference to free toleration in religion, and representative republicanism in politics. But far be it from me to condemn or reprobate those whose creed I believe to be less orthodox.

If I should be honored with your support and confidence—I will devote all my time and humble faculties, to guard and perpetuate State rights, & all the pure principles of our free representative government—endeavour to reanimate that sacred spirit which was cherished by the sages patriots and heroes of the revolution—to guard from corruption, the United States' Bank and all the honored institutions of the country, from which, I apprehend great danger to our civil liberty—to promote the morals—social intercourse and harmony of the United States—to preserve by every means of prudence and precaution, peace and good understanding with foreign nations, but if war, the (greatest curse to a country) should be unavoidable. to be ready by timely preparations, in arms, ammunition, arsenals and magazines—by classification and organization of the militia, and by every excitement of pride, honor and patriotism, to call forth the strength and resources of the country for the purpose of giving the most effectual resistance to invasion and aggression—to economise and retrench the expeditures of government—to promote and cherish agriculture and the landed interest of our country will be my first and dearest object—to promote arts, sciences and manufactures—to protect and encourage commerce the twin sister of agriculture, both foreign and domestic, by every means in my power, which our country, in materials and resources so abundantly abounds.

In support of such principles, and to advance the general improvement, wealth, happiness, harmony, union, and social interests of the United States—to avoid all alliances with foreign nations, to cultivate peace at home and abroad—commerce and good understanding with all nations, never assail, but at all times to be ready to defend—and to improve the great and numerous natural advantages, which peculiarly belong to our district by every practical and rational means of political policy.—Are the great objects, to which my mind will be directed, and which have induced me to offer you an entire devotion of my humble services, and I must solemnly assure you, that in the promised devotion of my humble abilities to your service, you shall not be disappointed, and to this, I pledge myself to my fellow citizens, to the district, to my conscience, and still more, to the confidence I entertain, and the hopes which I enjoy in the dispensations of an all-wise providence.

If with such declarations I may be deemed worthy of the confidence to which I aspire—It will not be presumptuous to assure those by whom it may be conferred, that I shall zealously endeavour to do the best I can for our common country, and so deport myself, as not to deserve either my own, or their reproach. When we reflect upon the blessings which have been so bountifully bestowed upon us—with how much gratitude should we turn our thoughts to that great and good being, from whom alone cometh every good and perfect gift, for having cast our destiny in a land of civil and religious freedom—Our Constitution is founded upon the principles of eternal justice, and in the purity of religion, we worship, not by compulsion, but in the way dictated by our best reason, the true and only God.—My first prayer is, that these blessings may be handed down to our latest posterity, and my only ambition, that I may in some measure be instrumental in securing this great object.

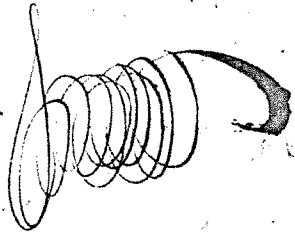


